## **RICHLAND LIBRARY**

It's no secret that libraries are changing, serving more people – and in different ways – than ever before. Richland Library is helping people find jobs, get ready for and succeed in school, and access technology and resources. As society shifts to a digitally enhanced dialog, the library has become equal parts high tech and high touch.

More than 215,000 Richland County residents have library cards.

On average each day, more than 8,500 people visit the 11 library locations throughout Richland County.

Last fall, Richland County residents passed a \$59 million bond referendum that will enhance library facilities over the course of the next several years. # **DIGITAL RESOURCES**

In addition to traditional resources such as children's books, popular fiction and nonfiction, music CDs and movies, the library also provides access to a wide range of free downloadables - eBooks, audiobooks, downloadable and streaming music, and eMagazines.

Richland Library Main offers an eReady Bar on the first level, where customers can test exciting new technology and learn how to use their new devices.

# **CAREER & JOB RESOURCES**

Richland Library's Business and Job Center is staffed with highly trained librarians and career coaches who offer classes and one-on-one assistance.

## **Coworking Center**

Consultants, freelancers and self-employed professionals can find inspiration at Richland Library. The Coworking Center, founded on the concept of a shared workspace to engage creativity, is located on the Third Level at Richland Library Main. The space offers multiple coworking desks, a Mac computer station with Adobe Creative Cloud and scanner, storage lockers, and an online reservation system. All for free!

# **OUTREACH**

Richland Library's commitment to our community is evident in our ability to meet people where they are. Whether a school-age child learning how to read or elderly individual who can't easily leave the house, we are equipped to provide access to books and resources to those who most often need them most.

## **Richland Library's Community Outreach highlights for 2013:**

- 429 programs attended by 8,209 people
- 60% increase in the number of adult programs offered
- 17% increase in average attendance per program
- 12,911 books delivered to homebound seniors

## **Here Comes Kindergarten**

Here Comes Kindergarten is a grant-funded effort that engages vulnerable families and provides parents and caregivers with the skills and tools they need to get their children ready for school. One hundred percent of participating parents reported that they know "a lot more" about school readiness, and 97% said that their children enjoy reading more because of the program. Here Comes Kindergarten has been held at Richland Library Eastover, North Main and Northeast; Gonzales Gardens and Allen-Benedict Court; Harbison Gardens Apartments; and Windsor United Methodist Church. The program is currently made possible by generous funding from United Way of the Midlands and partnership with Columbia Housing Authority, Richland School District Two, and School District Five of Lexington and Richland Counties.

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## **Project Summer Stride**

Project Summer Stride reduces learning loss by pairing tutors with struggling students for one-on-one reading, tutoring, special programs and enrichment activities in the summer months. Students also receive books to create a home library and school supplies for the next school year. Project Summer Stride was implemented in partnership with Harbison West Elementary School in School District Five of Lexington and Richland Counties, The Midlands Reading Consortium of the United Way of the Midlands, USC's Office of Programs and Evaluations, and a host of community tutors. The program is currently made possible by generous funding from United Way of the Midlands.

## **Book Trikes**

Have you seen our bikes full of books? The Richland Library Friends donated two book trikes, which frequently make appearances at community events. Free books, compliments of the Richland Library Friends, are given away to individuals to enjoy then share with a friend or neighbor.

## **ACA Enrollment Assistance**

Committed to advancing our community, Richland Library proudly provided a connection for area residents who were seeking reliable information about the Affordable Care Act (ACA), funded through generous support of the Knight Foundation Donor Advised Funds at Central Carolina Community Foundation. Thanks to partnerships with a large number of community organizations and a dedicated Community Engagement Team who met on an ongoing basis, the library offered forums, information sessions, and a series of Marketplace education and enrollment events at various Richland Library locations. Navigators were available on-site at the library to walk customers through the ACA sign-up process. More than 360 people received assistance with Affordable Care Act questions and enrollment on Saturday, March 29 at Main.

## **CHILDREN**

Home of the well-loved Maurice Sendak *Where the Wild Things Are* mural, Richland Library's <a href="Children's Room"><u>Children's Room</u></a> at Main and children's areas at all locations provide Midlands-area children an experience like no other. From storytime to puppet shows to fantastic children's librarians who are eager to help children find just the right book, Richland Library understands the importance of making sure children have access to the resources they need to learn and thrive.

## **Friends' Summer Learning Challenge**

This past summer, 20,076 participants took part in the Summer Learning Challenge. Much like the reading clubs of the past, children, teens and adults were rewarded for reading, but also earned rewards for coming to programs or other events, or designing and following their very own learning track.

# **TEENS**

Unveiled in 2013, Richland Library's <u>Teen Center</u> at Main is a contemporary, high-tech space specially designed for ages 12 – 18.

The space includes 3D printers, Microsoft Surface Windows 8 Laptops, iPads, a Microsoft Pixel Sense Touch Table, iMACs, an HD television, Xbox 360 / Wii U / PlayStation 3, a WhisperSync Vocal Recording Booth and ReadyAnimator Stations.


Teen Center programming includes The Teen Advisory Board, which meets once a month to plan programs, help with the website and perform service projects; and The Teen Otaku Association, where Richland Library's teens gather to discuss manga, also known as Japanese print comics, or anime.




## **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

# RICHLAND LIBRARY FOUNDATION

For the past several years, the <u>Richland Library Foundation</u> has focused its fundraising efforts primarily on annual giving to supplement the Richland County tax appropriation. In 2013, the Foundation embarked on a \$750,000 major gifts campaign to fund Learning Centers in seven library locations. Each Learning Center will be a hybrid of two existing services that are offered on a more limited basis within the Richland Library system – job centers and homework centers.

By day, the Learning Centers will provide the highest level of services to adult learners and job seekers. The centers will be equipped to offer training in areas such as resume writing, interviewing and computer skills in an effort to develop a competent, skilled cadre of workers. By afternoon and evening, the Learning Centers will transform into dedicated environments focused on homework support and technology training for students.


